
Amazingly, a hard copy edition of The Last Letters was listed, complete with dust jacket and loose plastic cover. Unable to resist, I snapped it up immediately (the joy of Brotherhood Books is that they cost very little) and emailed John to tell him of my find. John replied to congratulate me on my purchase and to my absolute delight, generously attached a copy of the John Shaw Neilson Society Inc. July 2017 tribute to Hugh Anderson, written by their President Graham Dunkley. "You might like to include this in your copy of the book", wrote John.



Pencil annotations by the previous owner are scattered throughout the book and for me, this is one of the pleasures of purchasing a second hand copy. It now sits alongside a 1923 edition of Poems of AL Gordon, that according to the flyleaf, was a gift 'To dear Mother, wishing you many happy returns of the day', dated 26.1.29.

So now, thanks to John, my copy of The Last Letters has a printed obituary tucked inside – for me to treasure – until my grandchildren decide to clean out Grandma's numerous bookcases and donate the book back to The Brotherhood. Then someone else may have the pleasure.




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

In 1886, a young man, J. Howlett **Ross,** who was later to become the Chief President of the Australian Natives' Association, spurred by the principles embodied in the desire to Advance Australia, devoted much of his time to write a book on Gordon and his works. He titled the book "The Laureate of the Centaurs" It was a penetrative story and put the spot light on "Australia's Greatest Poet" for ever more. J. Howlett Ross, the pioneer of Gordon's biographers had made a significant break through in revealing Gordon in his rightful place in

Australian literature.

J. Howlett Ross was a journalist and world renowned elocutionist.

The book was published in England in 1888 and remarkable were the immediate consequences thereof. Mr Ross, who was in London at the time received a letter from a Mrs Lees who wrote: "I am an old woman and a grandmother but not too old to remember that I shared the sorrow of the parting in those verses to Inez".

She Admired Gordon, but knew not of his regard for her until the time of his departure from England. Needless to state she grieved for and thought of him. It was thus that she prepared a beautiful wreath of white English wild flowers and asked Mr Ross to place it on Gordon's grave at Brighton, Victoria, Australia.

Mr Ross duly returned to Australia and in a letter to the 'Australasian' advised that he proposed to place the wreath on Gordon's grave on Saturday 25th June 1892 "about 3 in the afternoon".


With no further publicizing Mr J. Howlett Ross duly arrived to pay the tribute to Australia's greatest poet. To his surprise 100 others had assembled to bear homage to "a shining souls".

This was thus the first pilgrimage to Adam Lindsay Gordon's grave in the Brighton Cemetery.

In 1916 the 4th annual pilgrimage was held. Wreaths from ANA Branches in Wangaratta, Rutherglen, Richmond and Chiltern were included in the great pile of wreaths placed on the grave. The Chief President Mr Ostrom presided.

In 1917 the pilgrimage was arranged to coincide with Wattle Day—the first Sunday in September, Mr Hack, Vice President of the ANA presided.

In 1917-18 the ANA initiated moves to bring about the establishment of a special Australian section in all Public Libraries in the State of Victoria.




In 1922 at the wish of Mr Smithers Gadd, Trustee of A.L.Gordon's grave, the ANA agreed to accept the honor of having the trusteeship of the grave and holding in trust the title deeds of the grave. The Association was represented on the Gordon Memorial Committee with Vice President Dave

The unveiling of the memorial statue of Gordon in Spring Street Melbourne by the Premier, Sir Stanley Argyle took place on the 30th October 1932 before an assemblage of 1000 persons. Mr George Holland a Director of the ANA Board had the honor to commit to the care of the statue to the Parliament of Victoria. The ANA had been closely associated with the committee since the inception in 1912. Senator Blakey, a member of the Board of Directors, was the Secretary of the Committee. Likewise Syd Watson, General Secretary of the ANA and Mr Arthur Collis represented the ANA on the Gordon Memorial Committee which published the famed Gordon Memorial Volume containing the most sumptuously printed edition of Gordon's poems ever published.
